



Printing Instructions

I recommend using "Cover Stock" or lightweight cardstock paper {67 lb}, especially since this needs to be printed double-sided.

If you have a Double-Sided Printer: 1. Select: Print Range/From > pages **2** to **5** 2. Select: Layout > Two-Sided > "Short-Edge Binding" {This will ensure all the pages are right side up!} 3. Print!

Otherwise: Print pages 2 & 4, then print pages 3 & 5 on reverse side -OR- print each page one at a time (this booklet will not "make sense" unless it is printed on both sides and folded up.)







Abram and his nephew Lot, their families, flocks and herds settled in Bethel in Canaan, living alongside the local Canaanite tribes. Abram had become very wealthy in livestock plus silver and gold. Lot also had flocks, herds and tents, but there was not enough pasture or water for both Abram's and Lot's animals to graze



Fights began to arise between the herdsmen looking after Abram's and Lot's animals. So Abram said to Lot, 'Let's not have any more quarrelling between our herders. The whole land is before us. Let's part and go our separate ways. If you choose to go to the left, I'll go to the right; if you go to the right, I'll go to the left.'






